


NDE DAY AT ADMINISTRATORS' DAYS

WEDNESDAY, JULY 27, 2022





As we head towards the 2022-2023 school year, I want to say thank you. We all knew there would be challenges as we entered the pandemic, even if we did not know what they all would be. I also knew I would be able to count on all of you as educators to rise up to meet those challenges. I'm counting on you once again to help move our students and our state out of the pandemic and back into a normal routine.

What does it mean to "Restore Normal"? I don't believe it will be moving back to our old ways, instead now is a time to reset our expectations for what normal should be. We should not forget the experiences and challenges we've faced or the lessons we learned during the last several years but instead we should use those moments to improve. We don't want to go

back to the way things were, we should strive to improve on the circumstances that existed before the pandemic and emerge better, smarter, and more prepared for the unknown than ever before.

I know you are all well-aware of the challenges your schools and communities will continue to face and have a cautious attitude and concern about what comes next. NDE and schools have experienced a substantial amount of disruption, but it is through partnership between state and local that we will restore normal practices, routines, and energy toward improvement.

I know you are committed to move forward. The NDE is recommitting our efforts as well to examine what flexibilities are possible and necessary for schools. Together we will reinforce the strategies to address workforce needs and to make sure all students are prepared to succeed.

It is time to "Restore Normal" by setting a new path ahead. I'm sure some new twist or turn will happen, but we've learned that is normal and we can meet those challenges together.

RESSTORING NORMAL



The NDE is dedicated to ensuring the responsible, accountable, focused and transparent use of federal ESSER funds. The NDE prioritized investments based on community and stakeholder input, to help set a clear direction for renewal and acceleration, ensure transparency and signal to schools where to invest.

MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT

Provide access to comprehensive emotional and mental health services to students, staff, and communities.

- Nearly 19% of the set aside funds for evidence-based practices have been allocated for mental health supports.
- Example Investment: Mental Health Support Grant (\$5.1 million)
 - Partnerships through Nebraska's intermediary agencies, Educational Service Units, have created regional systems to maximize mental health supports.
 - Providing training in mental health first aid to districts.
 - Increasing access to licensed mental health practitioners.

FAMILY & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Reimagine meaningful family and community engagement.

- Around 11% of funds are supporting outreach, education, and support to families and communities.
- Example Investment: Ready Rosie (\$2.3 million)

- The NDE has previously leveraged preschool development grant funds to provide access to this evidencebased early childhood family engagement and literacy tool.

- Working closely with PDG partners, the NDE invested an additional \$2.3 million to further expand Ready Rosie to additional districts, targeting those classrooms serving students who were most impacted by COVID-19.

EDUCATOR & LEADER SUPPORT

Invest in high-quality professional development, upskilling, and the teacher and leader pipeline.

- 13% of evidence-based set aside funds have been allocated for high-quality professional learning opportunities and strategies to address the teacher shortage.
- Example Investment: Educator Shortage Call for Proposals (\$1.5 million)

- The NDE worked with stakeholders to better understand potential responses to the state's educator shortage. The NDE designed a call for proposals for higher education, districts, ESUs, and others to share ideas for immediate relief of critical shortage areas.

SYSTEM INVESTMENTS

Comprehensively modernize information, data, technology, and process systems.

- 13% of set aside funds are being used in this strategy area
- Example Investment: Exempt (Home) School System Improvements

- During the pandemic, Nebraska had an influx of requests for home school applications. Until recently, this involved paper copies for parents, the NDE, and schools. An investment in a developer's time has created a streamlined, online system that makes it easier for all involved.

LEARNING ACCELERATION

Ensure equitable access to grade-level instruction to address unfinished learning and support learning acceleration.

- This strategy represents the bulk of the investments of these funds, constituting roughly 41% of investments
- Example Investment: TNTP CSI Leadership Development Cohort and Learning Acceleration Series (\$2.7 million)

 Partnering with TNTP, the NDE designed a leadership development series specifically for CSI schools that
 are currently identified, and those that will be identified this fall.
 - The learning acceleration series is available to all public and private schools in the state, but was designed by district and ESU staff from areas serving students most impacted by COVID-19.

Research over the last decade has provided strong evidence that instructional materials can be one of the most cost-efficient and effective school improvement measures. Every Nebraska student deserves the opportunity to learn from high-quality, standards-aligned instructional materials to prepare for success in college, career, and civic life.

Through the Nebraska Instructional Materials Collaborative, the Nebraska Department of Education and key partners provide statewide leadership that informs and supports the decisions made locally related to curriculum and instructional materials. Over the past year, many Nebraska districts leveraged ESSER III funds to purchase high quality instructional materials and to provide professional learning to support implementation of those materials.

Supporting teachers by providing both high-quality instructional materials and the professional learning needed to use the materials allows teachers to have a greater impact on student achievement.

Teachers who are knowledgeable about the content they are teaching and comfortable with the materials they are using are more likely to be effective in the classroom. High-quality instructional materials are designed to help build a teacher's content knowledge, provide guidance to inform lesson planning, and offer structures to support collaboration with other teachers. This support is critical because of the time and effort educators spend searching for instructional resources:

- 73% of U.S. teachers say they are using materials found online more than they use hardcover textbooks.
- On average, teachers spend 12 hours per week searching for, or creating, their own materials.
- 82% of elementary teachers, and 91% of secondary teachers report using instructional materials they personally developed from Google, Pinterest, and other sites.
- Searching for supplemental materials can be exhausting, given the vast amount of content available online and the wide range of quality. Instructional coherence can be lost when materials from multiple sources are used.

Strengthening curriculum and instructional materials leads to increases in student achievement.

All instructional materials are not created equally, and great instructional materials do not cost significantly more. The Nebraska Instructional Materials Collaborative highlights high-quality instructional materials and offers Nebraska-specific resources to ensure instructional materials meet the expectations of Nebraska's College and Career Ready Standards. Educators can also find suggested steps for navigating the instructional materials selection process for English Language Arts, mathematics, and science, and social studies.
